The Affordable Housing Crisis

In the city, there are 3,000 families that make less than \$46,000 who are struggling to keep the roof over their heads. This results in half of all renters in the city burdened by their housing. In the urban ring of Charlottesville, which includes the highway 29 North corridor to the airport, over 4,000 families pay more than half of their income in housing costs. In Albemarle County 2,800 senior households struggle to afford their housing. Of those, 933 households pay more than half of their income toward housing.

Both localities have waitlists of at least 3 years for the Housing Choice Voucher, a federally funded program that will pay 30% of one's rent. Rents in the region have increased by 42% between 2011 and 2018, with residents experiencing a rent increase of 7% in 2017 alone. These startling figures will certainly grow as our population grows and as the housing market becomes tighter and more expensive.

Building New Affordable Homes is the Solution

Both our localities have shortages in the availability of affordable homes. In Albemarle County there are 77 seniors on the waitlist for age restricted and accessible affordable housing units. In Charlottesville City experts estimate 1200 brand new units are needed to address their housing gaps. New affordable homes can be built with significant investment from the localities and creating policies that will better allow affordable development.

What We Want in the City

From last year's Nehemiah Action, we still want zoning changes that will allow for more affordable development and for the site approval process to be expedited for projects with 20% affordable units. We will continue to monitor these and gain an understanding that affordable housing should be available in every neighborhood of the city. We also want the City Council to allocate \$1.55 million in the Charlottesville Affordable Housing Fund and a commitment to keep it funded. This year's proposed budget does not include any funding for the fund and interim City

Manager Mike Murphy recommends that for the next 5 years. He proposes \$10.3 million in other areas including redeveloping public housing, which is needed. However, in the middle of a housing crisis we cannot afford to lose a tool that can provide more affordable housing!

What We Want in the County

Similar to our request from last year's Nehemiah Action, we want \$1.5 million in the Housing Fund to build and preserve affordable homes and for it to prioritize the building of 150 accessible units for seniors that make less than \$35,000 per year by 2023. Last year Supervisors Ned Gallaway, Anne Mallek and Norman Dill committed to creating plans to make the Housing Fund permanent with earmarked annual revenue, a diverse advisory body for the fund and build 150 accessible units for seniors that make less than \$35,000 by 2023. While the Housing Fund is proposed to be funded again at \$700,000, there has been little to no movement on the rest of our proposals. Housing Funds that are established in this way are best practices and also considered housing trust funds. Over 700 housing trust funds exist around the nation and, including Virginia. They are able to leverage, on average, \$8.50 for every \$1 in the fund, increasing the amount of money available to developers to build more affordable homes.
