Throughout Advent, we light a second Advent wreath on our altar table, with a prayer of blessing for our Christian sisters and brothers in another country. This week's candle is lit for Mennonites in DR Congo.

The Democratic Republic of the Congo has been an area of major Mennonite interest and ministry in the 20th century. The Africa Inter-Mennonite Mission (AIMM) dates its first missionaries to 1912, in the West Kasai region. Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) first became involved in DR Congo in the 1950s when conscientious objectors were sent as volunteers. In the 1960 aftermath of political independence MCC partnered with others as a channel for relief supplies for various areas where local populations were displaced by political unrest. At the same time, MCC set up Pax and Teachers Abroad Program (TAP) there, and a steady stream of young people (including some now-PVMCers) went to Congo, where they served in various roles.

From 1978 to 2012, Mennonite baptized membership quadrupled, from about 60,000 to about 240,000. The 1,800 congregations are divided among three Mennonite groups. Political and sectarian violence has been a serious problem for many Mennonite congregations in DR Congo. In early 2017, Michael J. Sharp (EMU alum working for United Nations) was killed in the Kasai region while on a peacemaking mission. That same year, thousands of Mennonites there went into hiding to avoid the violence, holding services in the forests. Mennonite aid to the church is coordinated through joint efforts by Africa Inter-Mennonite Mission, Mennonite Mission Network, MCC, and others.

Bercy Mundedi, right, in 2013, became one of the first women ordained by Communauté Mennonite au Congo, at Kalonda Bible Institute where she taught for 10 years and is now director. Mundedi is the first Congolese woman to direct a Mennonite Church of Congo institution.
